



Maintaining Green Infrastructure

Mostly, native plant species are meant to be kept in their natural state. The City contracts with an environmental management firm to treat invasive species mechanically or chemically throughout the growing season. Occasionally, a high mowing or prescribed burn is also recommended as a treatment.

The principal flood problems in Wood Dale are in low-lying area caused by overflow of Salt Creek. As a result, storm drain outfalls become blocked and areas along small tributaries are flooded. The blocked sort of runoff infiltrates the sanitary sewer system, creating severe overloads and subsequent basement backups.

What is a flood?

A flood is defined in the Standard Flood Insurance Policy as a general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of normally dry land areas from overflow of inland or tidal waters or from the unusual and rapid accumulation or runoff of surface waters from any source.

What does a Flood Map Tell You?

On all flood maps, we will find Flood Insurance Risk Zone Designations. These designations indicate the degree of the flood hazard in specific areas of a community. The definitions are:

Zone A - Special Flood Hazard Areas inundated by the 100-year flood; base flood elevations are not determined.

Zone AE - Special Flood Hazard Areas inundated by the 100-year flood; based flood elevations are not determined.

Zone X - Areas determined to be outside the 500-year floodplain.

These are the zones in which Wood Dale has been designated. If you have any questions about what zone you are in, would like to see a flood zone map, or have questions about flooding and flood insurance, you can contact public works at, (630) 787-3764. Also, you can view the maps at, <u>https://msc.fema.gov/portal</u>.

What types of property may be insured against flood loss?

Almost every walled or roofed building that is principally above ground and not entirely over water may be insured if it is in a participating community in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), of which Wood Dale is. Contents also may be insured under separate coverage.

How is flood insurance purchased?

After a community joins the NFIP, a policy may be purchased from any licenses property insurance agent.

What are the steps leading to the purchase of flood insurance?

A property owner perceives a risk of flooding and decides to purchase flood insurance OR a lender making a mortgage informs the builder or potential buyer that the building is in a Special Flood Hazard Area and that flood insurance must be purchased as required by the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973. Then the homeowner would contact an insurance agent to purchase a policy.

How does a policyholder file a claim for flood loss?

The homeowner should immediately report flood loss to their insurance agent. The insured must file a "proof of loss" within a 60-day period after loss.

Essential Steps for Spring Tree Care

- Any sidewalks, or surfaces that surround a tree and you are using a de-icing salt should be thoroughly thawed, and then irrigated out. Salt can damage the tree roots.
- 2. Remove dead plant material such as dead leaves, dead branches, and old mulch from around the tree.
- 3. Edge planting beds in preparation for new mulch. The mulch should not be any deeper than 3 to 4 inches, and 2 to 3 inches away from the trunk to allow the base of the tree to be exposed. This will ensure that moisture escapes, reducing the growth of fungi and minimizing decay.
- 4. Prune plant material that blooms on new wood, and for fruit trees it is recommended to prune them in late winter, or early spring. Make sure to prune them before flowering to avoid causing stress to the tree.
- 5. Inspect and check trees and shrubs.
 - If one area of the tree looks sparse this could be a sign that your tree is under stress. This can be caused by insects, disease, drought, or even soil compaction.
 - Yellowing leaves could occur from excess water from winter and spring or indicating poor soil drainage.
 - Decaying wood that is cracking or breaking could be a sign of insects and disease.

History of Arbor Day

In 1872 J. Sterling Morton, the Secretary of the Nebraska Territory, started his campaign promoting the value of trees. He set a date of April 10th, 1872, for the first official Arbor Day Celebration. He promoted the event by offering prizes to the Counties and Individuals who planted the most trees on that day. The last Friday in the Month of April is now the official designated Arbor Day. J. Sterling's oldest son, Joy Morton, went on to establish the Morton Arboretum in 1922, which located in suburban Lisle.

The City of Wood Dale Public Works Department is responsible for maintaining and repairing City water mains, fire hydrants, and distribution valves. To ensure that the water distribution system is maintained and operating correctly, ongoing maintenance may be necessary. Please call (630) 350-3530 with questions.

WATER MAIN REPAIR All reports of leaks and water main breaks are investigated by staff as soon as possible.

Some water main breaks can leave some residents without water and can take two to four hours to complete. Service restoration may vary, depending on the severity of the repair.

During this time, a Public Works repair crew is assembled and dispatched to the repair site. Affected businesses and residences will be notified of the break/leak and that they may have low to no water pressure during the repair time. Once utilities are located, the water main is excavated and repaired. The final restoration of the work site usually takes two to four weeks from when the work has been completed. Site restoration depends on the restoration required and scheduling work with the other divisions. Winter excavations are usually completed during April and May. Restorations rely on the availability of materials to finish the repairs (e.g., hot asphalt).

A value is a mechanical device that blocks the flow of **VALVE REPAIR** A value is a mechanical device that blocks the flow of water in a pipe for sections of the City's distribution system to isolate repairs.

When a valve requires a repair or a replacement, public works crews need to close valves to isolate the area needing attention. This can cause water shutoffs in certain areas, so staff can safely access the area to complete the repair.

Once the new valve is in place, public works staff will test the valve to make sure it is functioning properly. This work can take two to four hours to complete, depending on the condition, and complexity of the replacement. Regular valve replacements are essential for protecting the longevity of the City's water infrastructure, ensuring residents continue to receive clean, reliable water service.



HYDRANT FLUSHING Public Works personnel conduct hydrant flushing to ensure the hydrants are operating properly.

Additionally, this allows staff to remove sediment from the pipes to maintain water clarity and quality. Occasionally, water becomes discolored after hydrant flushing. If this happens, residents are encouraged to let their faucets run for a few minutes if they notice any discoloration. If it does not clear the first time, people should wait a few minutes and run the water again. Residents should avoid washing clothes until the water is clear. Dates will be provided once hydrant flushing is scheduled.

Some additional highlights of 2024's training accomplishments:

APRIL

Distracted Driving Awareness Month Every day, at least 8 people are killed in an accident caused by distracted driving: that's almost 3,000 deaths per year. To bring awareness to the dangers of being preoccupied at the wheel, April is designated as Distracted Driver Awareness month.

Drivers who text are 23 times more likely to be involved in a crash. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports that sending or reading a text takes a driver's eyes off the road for 5 seconds, equivalent to driving the length of a football field at 55 mph blindfolded. Teen drivers are particularly at risk, with 42% admitting to texting while driving.

- » FF/PM Zachary Wright, Oliver Mayapis, and Nicholas Carollo all completed the 4-week Illinois State Fire Marshall Basic Fire Officer program.

Annual "CAP" Program Empowers Students and Families to Remain Safe

For well over 20 years, Wood Dale School District 7 has partnered with the YWCA to provide children with the opportunity to participate in the CAP Program in grades 1 and 4. "CAP" stands for the Child Assault Prevention Project. While the full name can sound intimidating, the statistics around abuse are even more sobering:

The National School Safety Center states:

• 1 in 10 students are regularly attacked verbally or physically by bullies. Elementary school age children are more frequently targeted for bullying by older students.

The National Institute of Child Health & Human Development states: • Boys are more likely to be bullied than girls.

· Girls are more likely bullied verbally while boys are more likely to be bullied physically.

The Illinois Coalition Against Sexual Assault states that:

• 1 out of 4 girls and 1 out of 6 boys will be sexually assaulted before they reach the age of 18. Of those, over 85% will be assaulted by someone they know and trust.



Fourth Grade students at Westview School will participate in the annual CAP Program this month, focusing on personal body safety.

The CAP Program includes an age appropriate presentation with all 1st graders at Oakbrook School and 4th graders at Westview School by a trained facilitator from the YWCA, along with classroom teachers who participate in some of the role plays. During the lessons, children learn that their body is their own; the difference

between good and bad secrets, and what to do if someone they know and trust hurts them. They also help the students to identify a safety network of adults that they can go to if they have any problems or concerns.

In advance of the lessons at each school, we also host a Personal Body Safety Awareness Parent Information Night. In order to maximize attendance, we provide dinner and childcare for families, with the goal of informing and empowering parents on ways to protect children from potential abuse and how to respond if they suspect their child to have been abused. During the parent presentation, the YWCA facilitators explain the CAP program to parents and even demonstrate some of the scenarios that they role play for students.

This annual program is one way in which Wood Dale School District 7 fulfills our mission: We will collaborate with all families to implement high-quality instruction and provide engaging learning experiences, empowering each student to reach their full potential, in a safe and supportive environment.

District 7 Students Show Gains in Reading & Math Scores


